

# A MISSION-LED APPROACH TO COMMUNITY CHANGE

To meet the challenges of the 21st century, our communities need to make rapid, far-reaching and unprecedented changes. Otherwise, we face compounding social and ecological crises.

Although the need for radical changes has been clear for some time, our communities are still only managing slow, incremental and fragmented change. This is insufficient to address the systemic challenges that we face, and their underlying drivers. We need to find better ways of working together and making radical change happen.

A mission-led approach to community change pushes us to find ways to achieve the speed and scale of change that would enable our communities to genuinely thrive through the 21st century.

# FOCUS OF THIS INTRODUCTORY TRAINING

A mission-led approach forces us to explicitly reframe, rethink and reorganise around what is actually needed - rather than what we currently think is possible.

A mission-led approach to community change therefore demands a massive shift in our mindset. It means working very differently to how most of us have been trained and rewarded to operate. This demands that we build our personal and community capacities to adopt and pursue mission-led change.

During this introductory training we will use collaborative learning approaches to help you to:

- Understand how a mission-led approach can help your community.
- 2. Practice adopting a mission-led mindset
- Gather skills for using a mission-led approach to organise, plan, and manage radical change for your community.
